## How Will The Safety Referendum Funds Be Used?

The Referendum will provide two types of initiatives to improve safety within our educational environments.

#### **Mental Health Programs & Services**

Approximately 70% of the money will be for mental health services, anger management, anti-bullying, addiction, school violence prevention, and support for students in need.

#### **Safety Monitoring & Communication Systems**



# Important Facts to Know

- The Lilly Grant which currently funds safety and mental health services will expire in 2022, and is not eligible for renewal.
- The mental health programs currently serve more than 700 students in the NAFCS school system, with hundreds more on waiting lists.
- Due to state legislation passed in July 2019, a tax referendum is the only way to fund mental health and school safety programs.
- Data shows mental health treatment is the key to preventing school violence.
